Why not join the 100 club?

A 100 Club is a form of lottery. Subscribers pay £2 per month and are entered into a monthly draw. All profits go to Ogbourne St Andrew Church.

First prize is 75% of the available pot, while second prize is 25%. There is no limit to the number of shares held by any one person, but no individual can win more than one prize per month. Christmas Waste and Recycling

Waste and recycling collection dates will not change over the Christmas and New Year period. Waste collection crews will be working on Bank Holidays Monday 27, Tuesday 28 December 2021, and Monday 3 January 2022.

Garden waste collections will cease for 2 weeks (last collection on Friday 24 December, collections resume Monday 10 January 2022). If you pay to have your garden waste collected, you can also leave your real Christmas tree next to your garden waste bin on your first collection in January.

If you have extra recyclable materials over Christmas such as cans, cardboard and paper, place these in suitable alternative containers alongside your bin.

Did you know that you can put the following in your blue-lidded bin?

- Recyclable wrapping paper* ✓
- Cardboard packaging ✓
- Plastic sweet tubs (up to 5 litres) \checkmark
- Mince pie foil cases ✓
- Christmas cards without glitter ~
- Gift tags \checkmark
- Squirty cream aerosols \checkmark
- ✓ **Biscuit tins**
- ✓ Plastic bottles and food container

*Use the scrunch test: squeeze the paper into a ball. If it stays in a ball, it is most likely made of paper only and can be recycled. If not, it is likely to contain other materials so cannot be collected for recycling

But remember, you can't add:

Foil-lined cardboard tubes Rigid plastic (eg toys) χ χ (eg Pringles tubes) χ **Batteries** Cling film χ χ Plastic packaging and polystyrene Electricals (eg fairy lights)* χ χ

*Never put batteries or electrical items into any of your household waste bins, as they could cause a fire in collection vehicles or at waste processing/sorting facilities. Drop them at a household recycling centre. Many supermarkets also have battery collection points.

You can put the following in your black box, in a tied plastic bag, in addition to clean glass bottles and jars (leave the lids on):

- Clean and dry clothes ✓
- Pairs of shoes, belts, handbags \checkmark

But please **don't** put in your black box:

- χ Flat glass
- χ Pyrex
- χ Lightbulbs

- Curtains and sheets \checkmark
- Blankets and duvet covers \checkmark
- χ Duvets
- Pillows χ

OGBOURNE ST ANDREW HISTORY GROUP UPDATE

Silks on the Downs

We are collaborating with Silks on the Downs in creating a "Local History and Heritage" project as part of their Community Benefit Programme. This aims to deliver benefits to the community in general and is an essential part of the fund raising exercise. We want to include the wider membership <u>and community</u> in future discussions and implementation. To do this we envisage a small team chosen from the Silks, History Group and wider community to sketch out a broad approach. Once we have the initial team in place and understand how to proceed we will then call for volunteers to work on specific aspects.

Audio History

A small group have trialled a new Audio History project. Once we have transcribed the recording, a slow process, we can then edit it and make it available either in text format or audio on the website. We are also revisiting earlier recordings and extracting useful information and stories which we will make available.

Mapping

Another project has been using mapping software to track the change of land ownership in the large estates in the parish, with some interesting results.

WI and Millennium Books

The text from the WI and Millennium books is being scanned to make it simple to access the information currently hidden in them. By making the data searchable we can begin to correlate isolated facts and create more of a coherent local story. We are contemplating creating a new photo book for 2022. Details to follow.

A group of 20 volunteers got together to tidy the exterior of the pub and a great difference it has made too. With thanks to Mark, the owner, we had a skip on hand and managed to fill it. It was great to be able to actually start work!



Vacancy on our management committee

We have a vacancy on our management committee to lead our operations workstream. As we prepare for the purchase of the pub, our focus turns to operations including the recruitment, processes and systems we'll need in place to get the pub ready for opening. So, if you have the skills or experience to lead a team on this vital workstream, and also play a role on our management committee, then please do get in touch.

In addition, we're also looking for skilled tradespeople who can volunteer some of their professional experience. Securing the funds to buy the pub

We are well into the process of acquiring the pub. We hit our share offer target of £240,000, secured a grant of £50,000 from More Than a Pub and been approved for





a £50,000 loan from Keyfund. As we announced in October, our application for the Government's Community Ownership Fund (COF) was sadly not successful, despite being eligible and meeting all the selection criteria. So to raise the remaining funds, we're applying for a long-term commercial loan (as was our original plan). Whilst a successful COF outcome would have been the cherry on the cake and allowed us to reduce borrowing, we still have a viable plan and are still working towards an opening in Spring/Summer 2022.

CALL 105

Winter weather and power

As we've seen recently, extreme winter conditions can cause power disruption. Our

power supplier, Scottish & Southern Electricity Networks (SSEN), reminds us to keep mobile phones charged and a torch plus batteries within easy reach. If you have an old analogue phone, keep it handy, as this will work without electricity.

SSEN has a Priority Services Register for people who need extra support in a power cut, for example if you are over 60, live with children under five, use medical equipment/aids reliant on electricity, are deaf or blind or have a chronic illness or disability. Contact SSEN on 08002943259 or go to ssen.co.uk/priorityservices to find out more about joining the register.

If there is a power cut, call 105 to let SSEN know, or visit ssen.co.uk/ready-together.

You can also download the free Power Track app, which allows you to report and track any power disruption in your area and be kept up-to-date with restoration times.
