OGBOURNE ST ANDREW CHURCH NEWS

Renewing the church's layout

As at the week beginning 23rd October, we are close to getting approval for our internal changes to the west end of the church building.

These changes are to:

- remove the pews from the west end only, while retaining two as memories of their past
- install a disabled WC in the south west corner by the Tower entrance
- install a servery for hot drinks and food alongside the south door
- remove the oak partition behind the font
- relocate the vestry to the north west corner, reusing the oak partition
- install a storage area in front of the new vestry, which will match the oak partition
- install a Trench Arch drainage system behind the west end of the church.

All these changes have been agreed now with the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) and we now proceed to public consultation. The DAC formal notice was displayed on the church Notice Board for 28 days, together with a plan showing the existing layout and proposed changes.

HISTORY GROUP UPDATE

Time seems to be relentlessly moving towards Christmas with, I'm afraid, still no meeting of the History Group in sight. The timeline of the Wheatsheaf/ Silks, donated by the History Group, has been well received, as have the historical photographs now hanging in the old Public Bar area.

Our researches into the history of some of the properties along the main road have revealed some fascinating facts. One group of four cottages plus land sold in 1906 for £125 – just over £30 a cottage! In 1914 another pair of cottages, combined into one, changed hands for the princely sum of £32.10.0. More importantly we now have new information and pictures of the families involved.

On another front we know more about the interconnection between the Large family (important farmers who in the mid 19th century worked what was effectively the Ogbourne Maisey Estate of over 1,000 acres and employed 55 workers), the Liddiards (who leased the church chancel), the Strattons and the Goddards (both wealthy families). Family researchers in this country and Australia are involved in piecing together the family trees.

A brief review of the online newspapers brought to light some amusing and sad stories. The latter was the inquest held into the death of four year old William Sawyer in 1868 who was running after a horse which lashed out and killed him. Interestingly he is not recorded in our graves register although it was a well established family in the village.

In 1891 another case involved John Carwardine, son of the vicar, who was convicted of stealing 'a valuable oil painting and silver plate' from the vicarage and was sentenced to a month's imprisonment. His father became blind in later



life and his gravestone in the churchyard bears the inscription 'Now I See'.

Finally, in 1952, Bert Woodage appeared in court for throwing a pint of beer over PC Opie in the Wheatsheaf. He pleaded guilty, said he couldn't remember, was drunk and was fined £1.

WINTER PREPARATIONS

On 7th November, SSE Energy joined the Parish Council meeting to discuss support that is available to parishioners in the event of a power cut, and to provide advice about parish winter preparations.

The Priority Services Register is free to join and holds details of anyone in the community who might require extra help and support in the event of a prolonged power cut. You may wish to be on the register if you:

- Are deaf or hard of hearing
- Have a disability
- Live with children under five
- Are blind or partially sighted
- Have a chronic illness
- Use medical equipment/aids reliant on electricity
- Are over 60
- Temporarily need extra support.

NEEDLEFELT WORKSHOP

Five of us spent a very enjoyable day on 2nd November in the "Community Room" of the Silks on the Downs, learning to needle felt. Under the watchful eye of our tutor, Erica Hemings, we produced a ginger cat, a rabbit, two wrens and a

People on the register will flash in red in SSE's systems during a power cut and the more vulnerable are visited or phoned to check that they are OK. SSE are very keen to know about all those who are vulnerable in the parish to ensure they are supported appropriately.

Leaflets on the scheme are available from the Parish Clerk or via the parish website. Light sticks are available for those who should not use candles. Power banks are also recommended to ensure that mobiles can remain charged in a power outage.

105 is the number to dial to get through to the local network operator call centre to report a power cut. This number can be used nationwide.

Another useful tool is the free Power Tracker app which enables tracking of power cuts and their status. It also shows where electric vehicle (EV) chargers are located.

WARM SPACES IN MARLBOROUGH

St Peter's Church in Marlborough is now open to the public as a "warm space". Do please join them for a hot drink with biscuits and cake – a warm welcome awaits you. Opening times: 10am to 4pm, Monday to Saturday



Marlborough Library, like all Wiltshire Council libraries, has officially become a warm space this winter, providing a warm and friendly welcome to support anyone who needs help through the cost of living crisis. Working with Warm and Safe Wiltshire and The Rural Communities Energy Support Network, our library staff can assist residents seeking basic energy advice and make referrals to experienced energy advisors. Anyone who would benefit from some free essentials can also pick up a Warm Pack, containing a hot water bottle and blanket. And Marlborough Library is now also providing free hot drinks every Thursday afternoon. You can call in to meet others, sit for a while, read a magazine or do a puzzle, and you don't have to be a library member.

Monday afternoon 2pm to 7pm Wednesday 9.30am to 5pm Thursday 9.30am to 7pm (free hot drinks 2pm-4pm) Friday 9.30am to 5pm Saturday morning 9.30am to 1pm (Closed Tuesdays and Sundays)

KEEPING THE RAILWAY PATH SAFE FOR USERS

The railway path that runs through the east of the village is reserved for the use of cyclists, runners, walkers and horse riders. Motorcycles and off-road vehicles are not permitted on the path, but do sometimes seem to be using it. These vehicles not only pose a risk to other users, but can cause considerable damage to the surface and disturb wildlife. CHRISTMAS WASTE AND RECYCLING



Waste and recycling collection dates will be delayed by **one day** over the Christmas period. Waste collection crews will not be working on Bank Holiday Monday 26 December, but will be working on Tuesday 27 December 2022, and Monday 2 January 2023.

Check your waste, recycling, and garden waste collection days online at www.wiltshire.gov.uk/christmas-waste-and-recycling-collections.

If you have extra recyclable materials over Christmas such as cans, cardboard and paper, place these in suitable alternative containers alongside your bin.

Did you know that you can recycle the following in your blue-lidded bin?

- Recyclable wrapping paper*
- Plastic sweet tubs (up to 5 litres)
- Christmas cards without glitter
- Biscuit tins
- Plastic bottles and food containers

* Use the scrunch test: squeeze the paper into a ball. If it stays in a ball, it is most likely made of paper only and can be recycled. If not, it is likely to contain other materials so cannot be collected for recycling

Remember, you can't put these in your blue-lidded bin:

- Electricals incl. fairy lights*
- Batteries*
 Cling film

- Polystyrene
- Foil-linked cardboard tubes eg Pringles

^{*}Never put **batteries or electrical items** into any of your household waste bins as they can cause fires in collection vehicles or at waste processing/sorting facilities. Drop them at a Household Recycling Centre.

However, you can now put out **small household batteries** alongside your kerbside recycling every fortnight. Put them in a sealed clear sandwich bag, on top of your blue-lidded recycling bin or beside your blue recycling sack.

Garden Waste

Garden waste collections will cease for 2 weeks (last collection on Friday 23 December; collections resume Monday 9 January 2023).



If you pay to have your garden waste collected, you can also leave your real Christmas tree next to your garden waste bin on your first collection in January, and your tree will go to be composted (don't put out fake trees as they will not be collected).

- Carboard packaging
 Mince pie foil cases
- Squirty cream aerosols
- Drinks cans



DESERT ISLAND DISCS – Janice Hetherington



The Desert Island Discs series continued with another successful evening on 30th September, with local resident Janice Hetherington interviewed by genial host Roger Swan. The direction of Janice's life was outlined in an initial article before the event, so I will describe some of the highlights of the evening.

Janice recalled a happy childhood enjoying holidays travelling around the beautiful Scottish landscapes and coasts, with her parents and sister. Her first musical choice recalled the early days of children's television with the theme from 'Watch with Mother', the Dolly Suite by Fauré.

Her determination to study Physics, Maths and Chemistry, traditionally maledominated disciplines, at Retford High School at A-level, (while listening to 'I Got You Babe', by Sonny and Cher), gained her entrance to the University of Kent to read Chemical Physics. This led to a PhD at Strathclyde University in Polymer Science; 'Maggie May' by Rod Stewart bought back student memories.

Her challenging and rewarding career included undertaking scientific research at Dunlop and the Royal Military College of Science at Shrivenham where she later became the first female lecturer. She equalled the intellect of men in a society where women were fighting for respect, reputation and job opportunities. She recalled bringing equipment on a trolley into one of her lectures and saw surprise when she began lecturing as the audience expected a man! Times have changed!

After marrying John, they renovated a near-derelict cottage in Maizey and she chose 'Spring' from Vivaldi's Four Seasons, and 'The Way You look Tonight' by Peter Skellern to remind her of this period.

Whilst having three children she juggled home life with research contracts and supported her husband's career with two stays in America, before lecturing the military again on her return. Dolly Parton and Kenny Rogers were singing 'Islands in the Stream' on the radio during long road trips round the USA.

Dance, both ballroom and Scottish, have been enduring pastimes for Janice and John and prompted her choice the 'Minister On The Loch – Strathspey' by Roy Goldring.



Since retiring, enjoying being with her children and grandchildren and travelling have been her pleasures.

Janice was modest about her abilities and career which she successfully managed to continue whilst bringing up a family, in an era where expectations for working mothers were very different to today. Whilst listening to her recall emotional and significant memories there was an overriding sense of embracing the joy of life and all it offers and being grateful for it.

There will be further evenings next year, which promise to be revealing and insightful, and we are grateful to our guests so far for being prepared to open their lives to the audience. I urge you to join that audience to find out about the people we live among.

CARER CAFÉ IN MARLBOROUGH
