


The Comedy of Errors: this year's Ogbourne Maizey outdoor theatre!

Bay Meadows update

The strategically important wildlife corridor at Bay Meadows between Ogbourne Maizey and Marlborough has now been successfully purchased by Wiltshire Wildlife Trust. Situated on the eastern side of the A346, Bay Meadows covers 1.3km of the River Og and 12 hectares of adjacent water meadows, and is home to otters, kingfishers, and wild brown trout. It is also one of the last refuges of water voles, which have decreased by over 94% nationally and are now extinct in nearby counties.

Work is ongoing to restore the floodplain meadow into a better habitat for species such as water vole and wild brown trout, and for pollinators. Alongside the enhancements will be a comprehensive community engagement programme, and the creation of a nature area

for the community and its visitors to enjoy. Community groups have already held activities there, including Marlborough Wellbeing, Building Bridges and Action for Insects, and there are plans for more. Building back wetter: A new wetland on the River Og

The chalk rivers and streams of the North Wessex Downs are a rare and prized feature of the rolling chalk landscape. However, over the centuries the chalk valleys of the Og and the Kennet have changed with the ever-increasing influence of human activity, and the amount of water found in the landscape has diminished significantly as land has been drained for agriculture and development and rivers have been diverted, dredged, and straightened. In the UK it is estimated that we have lost a staggering 90% of our wetland habitats in the last several hundred years and over 10% of our freshwater and wetland species are threatened with extinction. Wetlands are some of the most threatened habitats in the world, yet also the most vital for wildlife and people.

Holding more water in the environment through the restoration of wet ecosystems can have a wide variety of benefits from creating new habitats for wildlife and increasing biodiversity, reducing flood peaks and protecting people from the misery of flooding, helping recharge the aquifers that underpin much of our public water supply and providing spaces for people to enjoy nature. Action for the River Kennet (ARK) are very proud to be working alongside a growing community of farmers, landowners, conservation-minded organisations and statutory agencies who are playing a role in reversing the decline of wetlands in the Kennet Valley.

Here on the River Og, ARK have recently finished building a series of new wetland scrapes at Maisey Farm, close to the perennial headwaters of the river at Bay Bridges. The project has been an opportunity to wet a significant area of land which historically would have had a much stronger connection to the flood plain. In addition to the infiltration and habitat benefits of the new wetland, the works also included the addition of circa 120m of permissive access around the wetland and the replacement of a dilapidated footbridge, to help create inviting and interesting public access to a wetland space. ARK returned to



Maisey Farm in March and, with the help of our fantastic volunteer network, planted thousands of native wetland plants as a finishing touch before the spring.

HISTORY GROUP UPDATE

Work is still going on in the background during the winter months, pulling together a coherent history of the Wheatsheaf / Silks and the Axe and Compass. It would seem that retired Naval Captain Nehemiah Reed created the Wheatsheaf in the mid 1850s. Based in Marlborough at the 'Anchor Brewery' in the High Street next to what is now the Polly Tearooms, he was instrumental in building a chain of inns and pubs in the area. He and his wife ran a local campaign to purchase and equip a lifeboat (The Royal Wiltshire) which was based for many years at Dover.

Research into the history of some of the village cottages has revealed some interesting leads. For example, there seems to have been a village 'Washpool', although it is not clear where this was situated. Most likely at Wetpits, but if anyone with local connections has any knowledge of it, please let me know! Anyone wanting to revive the old method of washing your laundry in the Og should perhaps contact the Parish Council first!

A darker side of the old days is revealed in the number of buildings burnt down. For example the Marlborough Journal, Saturday 11 May 1771, reported that: 'fire entirely consumed three tenements occupied by William Hawkes, the Widow May, and Harry Lapper, together with their household furniture and wearing apparel, except two beds on which an infirm old man and woman were carried out of the flames, the latter of whom, it is reported, is since dead of the fright. The fire is supposed to have been occasioned by carrying some straw ashes out of one house into an adjoining hovel'. The dangers of thatched buildings (or 'hovels', as they so gently put it!).

Carer Support Wiltshire – volunteers needed

Would you like to learn new skills, or use your existing ones, to help others? Are you looking for a way to contribute positively to your community and to meet new people? If so, have you considered volunteering?

Carer Support Wiltshire are a local charity who support unpaid carers in the county. Someone is an unpaid carer if they support someone who is unwell, has a disability or is elderly. Many people support family members and they do so because they want the best for the person they care for. But caring for someone can be very difficult, emotionally, and physically, and can leave the person caring feeling worn out and isolated. Carer Support Wiltshire are currently looking for volunteers to fill vacancies that directly support people who are caring for someone. If you would like to find out more, or if you have a skill you feel could be put to use, they'd love to hear from you. Vacancies include the following (full training provided):

Here to Talk Telephone Befriender: The Here to Talk service provides low level emotional support to carers across Wiltshire. You will be a friendly voice at the end of the phone, a listening ear and someone who will provide reassurance during challenging times. Successful applicants will have excellent listening skills and be empathetic and non-judgemental. You will be able to commit to a minimum of half an hour every two weeks.

Bereavement Help Point Facilitator: We are looking for a facilitator for our bereavement help point in Devizes. You would need to be able to commit to a minimum of two hours every fortnight to help run a fortnightly bereavement group, which supports unpaid carers who are recently bereaved. You will welcome, support and listen to people who attend. The ideal people for this role will have an understanding of grief and be compassionate and empathetic.

Carer Cafe Facilitator: We are looking for volunteers to help run our carer cafe in Pewsey. You will need to be able to commit to a minimum of two hours per month. The aim of this role is to create a safe and supportive group environment for unpaid carers at a local venue, providing them with a much-needed break from their caring responsibilities.

£2 bus fares extended

The Government's £2 single bus fare promotion has been extended until 30 June. The fare price reduction, which began on 1 January, aims to get more people to use buses during the current cost of living challenges. If more people choose to leave their car at home and take the bus, it will help to maintain bus routes in Wiltshire, as well as reducing congestion and carbon emissions and improving air quality. Most bus services are included in the promotion, including the Swindon 80 and X5 that run through the village.

50th Anniversary of the Ridgeway National Trail

The Ridgeway National Trail is part of a prehistoric track that once stretched about 250 miles across Britain from the Dorset coast to the Wash on the coast of Norfolk, providing a route for travellers over the high ground which was less wooded and drier than routes through the villages below. Often known as Britain's oldest road, the Ridgeway National Trail was created 50 years ago and still follows the same route over the high ground used since prehistoric times.

The trail runs for 87 miles and passes through two distinctive landscapes: the open downland of the west within the North Wessex Downs Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) and the more gentle and wooded countryside of the Chilterns AONB in the east.

It starts close to home at Avebury, running along the top of the open downland behind Rockley, Ogbourne St Andrew and Maizey, passing Barbury Castle and crossing the A346 at Ogbourne St George before running north again up past Liddington Castle. It then follows this ridge of chalk hills in a north-easterly direction to reach lyinghoe Beacon lying to the northwest of London.

This year marks 50 years since the trail was created, and is a particularly special time to visit the Ridgeway with new activities and events to celebrate its 50th anniversary. A plea from Maizey Manor Farm

We all enjoy the beautiful countryside around the village. But we would please remind everyone to remember the Countryside Code when using the public rights of way around and across Maizey Manor Farm. Particularly in regard to sticking to these public rights of way and not walking on the private land.

Dogs must be kept under effective control to ensure they stay away from wildlife, livestock and horses. They should be kept on a lead or in your sight, and return to you on command.

Your dog should not stray from the path or area where you have the right of access. Please pick up after your dogs and take poo bags home with you. Don't throw them into the hedge or grass!

Cyclists – please don't come up behind horse riders, but let us know you are there.
