'Ask Gareth': Repairs to broken household items

I am offering a community service to repair broken household items at little or no cost that would otherwise be binned or sent for recycling. The only cost is for any spare parts needed; I don't charge for my labour. This is similar to the Repair Shop on TV, but I am not looking to repair 'treasured possessions', rather reduce the amount being recycled or sent to landfill. So many items that are broken or not working are being thrown away that often only require a minor repair to make them useable again.

The service I offer covers the following:

- Home appliances, such as toasters, vacuum cleaners, lamps, etc.
- Garden appliances, such as lawnmowers, leaf blowers, etc.
- Chairs, tables and other small furniture, both indoor and outdoor.

Unfortunately I can't take on white goods such as fridges, stoves, washing machines etc., computers, televisions, mobile phones or microwaves.

- A leaf blower that would not switch on. I removed clogged up dust and restored it to full working condition.

- A dining room chair with a collapsed seat base, one of a valuable set. I made up a new contoured base using layers of plywood and replaced the original cover. Cost was £16 for the materials used.

- A set of Bose noise-cancelling headphones with perished padding on ear pieces and headband. I replaced the padding for £25.

- A small wooden box used in the church for communion services, that had been dropped. I glued it back together and polished it up so it is fully useable again.

Church fundraising update

As you know the PCC is working on raising funds to finance the cost of the major reorganisation and improvement of the west end of the church. We are working on several events for the summer, the first of which will be the Antiques Valuation Day on 14th June; save the date and watch out for further details.

Meanwhile our fundraising consultant reports that he has recently submitted grant applications to twelve smaller and regional trusts, identified a further ten trusts for proposals shortly, and has in view a similar number of larger trusts to whom we can apply only when we have secured 50% of our target. The results of these applications will be known over the coming months, as and when the relevant trustees meet and make their decisions.

The PCC will be contributing a significant sum from its reserves, and we are pleased to confirm that a few cash donations and pledges have so far been received from parishioners. Please contact me if you wish to add to these kind gestures.

I will report on progress in coming newsletters.

Once again, we want to express our heartfelt gratitude for your support for our local pub. Whether you've been a guest, a volunteer, or a member, your unwavering support has been instrumental in helping the pub navigate through these challenging times.

Pub tenancy progress

Since the special meeting in January, the pub committee has set about finding a tenant to take the pub forward. We have interviewed applicants and reviewed their business plans. I'm pleased to say we are currently negotiating contract terms and conditions with a prospective tenant for the Silks, who we believe is a great fit to run the pub successfully and achieve our local community vision. There is much work to do, and it is not a done deal until we have a signed contract. We are hopeful we can complete the agreement in April. We will inform you once we have completed the process – successfully or unsuccessfully! The committee will hold an in-person community meeting soon after.

In the meantime, we can't stress enough how much we value your support. We continue to rely on your volunteering to keep the pub running through March and into April. February trading has been challenging, so we urge you to keep using the pub throughout March. Your continued patronage is crucial to our success.

Trading

At the January meeting, we briefly outlined the improvements in our trading in November and December. For the first time, the Silks generated a much-needed profit due to the efforts of the community, volunteers, and committee.

January and February are traditionally very challenging months for the hospitality sector. The Silks is not immune to this, but we again traded profitably in January. February was different; footfall and covers declined, and volunteer support dipped. The last four months have been tough, but we have generated a net profit of £9,000 over that period. Well done, and thank you to you all. Please be conscious that it only takes a few poor weeks of trading – such as those in February – to deplete our reserves.

March is vital for us, and we would like to build our reserves further by trading profitably. We encourage you to use the pub this month, ideally dining.

Events

We have a full community events programme in March and April, which can be seen on the pub website. Our monthly quiz is frequently a sell-out, and the bridge club goes from strength to strength. Look out for a new Spring menu and more community events in April.

First-floor refurbishment

The eagle-eyed among you will have noticed that we have cleared the rooms above the pub, and the maintenance crew has been banging away upstairs! We quickly figured out





that tenant applicants saw the potential for the rooms to boost revenue or be used as staff accommodation. In April, we will be looking to raise funds for the refurb and will call on your building and decorating skills to help with the refurbishment work.

History Group Update

The reaction to the 20th anniversary of the Group in the last newsletter was positive, with a call for more newspaper reports from over the years. Always willing to oblige our readers, here are a few choice extracts:

No bicycle lights 1937

Bicycles without front lights cost **Sidney Morgan**, Rose Cottage, Ogbourne St. Andrew and **Arthur Day**, Ogbourne St. Andrew. Each fined 5s.

Rose Cottage was next to the Wheatsheaf and was merged with Wheatsheaf Cottage (confusingly further away from the pub) in the 1960s.

Various Coroner's bills:

(Random selection from Coroners' invoices)

1754. Ogbourne St Andrew. **Thomas Mott**, aged about 2: fell into a well and was drowned.

1765. Ogbourne St Andrew. **John Wise**, late of Lambourne: found dead in a field; lack of sustenance

1774. Ogbourne St Andrew. **Mary Moore**: found dead in the snow; inclement weather.

Bricklayer death 1907

OGBOURNE ST. ANDREW. FATAL ACCIDENT. An inquest was held in the Savernake Cottage Hospital, into the death of a bricklayer named **Martin** of Marlborough. The deceased was demolishing the disused Baptist chapel at St. Andrew when a large portion wall collapsed without warning, and fell on his legs, one of which was fractured. Moved to Savernake Hospital he appeared to be recovering, when complications supervened, and he died. The Coroner returned a verdict of "Accidental death."

This was the "Zion Chapel" sited behind Crowlynch and Eastview.

Evidence of a 'Reading Room' in Maisey 1897

In a sale by **R. P. Tanner** (Maisey Manor) of 14 estate cottages, this intriguing description:

Lot 2.—All those TWO COTTAGES (one of which was formerly used as a reading room), in the occupation of **Mr. Wm. Prictor**, with garden and two woodhouses, the whole being let at the low rental of £7 10s. per annum.

These cottages were probably those which stood on what is now the parking area for Keeper's Cottage. Any comments on the presence of a Reading Room in Maisey?
