Her name is Jilly Holness and if you enter her name onto YouTube, you will see films of her instructing and competing with her dogs at championship events for dog agility. She started her training in the village 13 years ago and has enjoyed it so much, she wants to give something back – as a thank you.

That something is an event in the field, on the afternoon of Saturday 7th September 2024. Jilly and some colleagues will demonstrate to you how clever their dogs are and you will be able to try your hand with your own dog over jumps and a tunnel or maybe one of Jilly's dogs – if you would like to try a little bit of training! Further details nearer the time. There will be stalls offering drinks, food, ice cream, items to buy and exciting things to do for all the family.

I'll finish with a few more details of Jilly's very full life with animals.

Jilly turned 70 in May. She is married to Brian, has three adult girls and three grandchildren. She lives today with ten dogs (three Border Papillons, one Mini American Shepherd and six Border Collies).



Jilly started training her grandparents' dog, a Golden Retriever, when she was just 10 years old and took it to dog classes. She also enjoyed the company of many neighbourhood dogs and one even learnt to use the door knocker to see if she was in! At the age of 19/20 Jilly started Obedience Training and became an instructor. In Obedience, she competed and judged at championship level and also competed at Crufts. At the age of 55 she changed her passion from Obedience to Agility. She competed in championship classes throughout the country with her dogs and many have qualified to compete at the Horse of the Year Show at Olympia. It takes several years to reach championship judging level, which Jilly has really enjoyed, and it allows her to give a little back to the sport she so loves.

The 100 Club and how it works

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) set up the 100 Club a few years ago in order to provide a modest stream of monthly income for the upkeep of the church in Ogbourne St Andrew whilst at the same time providing some interest for contributors in the form of regular cash prizes.

With a potential maximum of one hundred members (as the name suggests) we have currently sold 89 shares, leaving 11 numbers available to current and future members. Each share costs £2 per month (payable by Standing Order), and, whilst most members have just a single share, some own five or even ten shares. Obviously the more shares you own the greater the chances of winning, which of course is the reason that some names come up as winners more often than others; it is not fixed! However, you cannot win more than one prize per month.

In the monthly draw 50% of receipts is distributed as prizes, currently amounting to £67 as first prize and £22 as second prize – not a bad return if you are lucky.

Polling day – Thursday 4th July

The general election is taking place on Thursday 4th July, and the polls will be open from 7am - 10pm.

- You have until 18th June to register to vote if you're not registered already
- You have until 5pm on 19th June to apply for a postal vote (postal vote packs sent out around 10 days before polling day)
- You have until 5pm on 26th June to apply for a proxy vote (for someone to vote on your behalf)
- You have until 5pm on 26th June if you want to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate (if you don't have photo ID)

Remember your photo ID!

You now need to show **photo ID** to vote at polling stations for the general election. Accepted forms of photo ID include passports, photographic driving licences, biometric immigration documents, and certain concessionary travel passes.



Project Andrew: revitalising our church



The small Norman church that has stood for 900 years in this place is a historic landmark in the village of Ogbourne St. Andrew. After many years of tireless work the PCC has been given the go-ahead for a major refit to bring the building into line with modern requirements.

We are raising funds towards significant enhancements of the church's facilities by a reorganisation which will include a connection to mains water supply, the installation

of an accessible toilet, a kitchenette and a larger free space for much needed community use at the west end of the building. We believe that this project will provide a greatly improved experience for visitors to the church and a better use of its space. In addition the church will be revitalised with unobtrusive, bright modern lighting and a fresh coat of paint.

The aim is to provide a community space fit for the 21st century, both for those who worship in our church and also for the wider community for a range of new activities.

Fundraising update

Our fundraising consultant, Paul Baird, is working hard on submitting applications on the PCC's behalf for grants towards the cost of the planned reorganisation. However, there is little in the way of positive results to report so far.

Paul tells me he has applied to 24 trusts, with a further five applications in preparation. Only one has so far responded (with a £500 donation). Our own direct application to Wiltshire Historic Churches Trust resulted in a very welcome £4,000 grant from them.

We presume that the trustees of all these organisations will meet over the coming months, and we very much hope that we shall have positive results to report. Meanwhile, patience seems to be the order of the day.

Newspaper reports

Finally, to continue the selection of various newspaper reports through the years:

'Visitation of God' 1855

An Inquest was held on William Porton (70), agricultural labourer at Barbury Farm who apparently in his usual health, went to bed and died in his sleep. Verdict: Visitation of God.

Rick Fire 1865

Mr Pinniger of Ogbourne St Andrew suffered a second rick fire in four years. A large quantity of wheat and farm implements were destroyed. It occurred at



half past one when the men were at lunch. The cause remained a mystery. He was insured.

Sheep Stealing 1870

John Whitbread of Ogbourne St Andrew was committed for stealing a sheep from William Grant of Port Fields. Blood was traced on the road to Whitbread's cottage and on searching the remains of the animal were found.



How The Olympia got its name

Over the years, several newcomers to the village have asked about the derivation of the name of the cul-de-sac named "The Olympia" in Ogbourne St Andrew. In response to the same question asked in the 20th anniversary edition of this newsletter recently, Ian Davis has shared the following piece of history. This is an abridged version of a piece written by a member of the Swanton family just before the Olympia was built in the early 1990s, who, when he retired from farming, formed the small building company Kennet Valley Homes, which built a number of houses locally on mainly small disused farmyards.

Frank Swanton, the proprietor of Kennet Valley Homes, commenced farming on his own account in 1910 at South Farm Chiseldon as a tenant of the Calley Estate. In 1914, Ogbourne Camp construction started and Frank Swanton moved to North Farm, West Overton. Eventually, the freehold of North Farm was purchased by the Hon Joseph Watson, a soap magnate from Warrington. Frank Swanton was retained as farms manager.

During the next three years an estate of some 9,000 acres was built stretching from Hackpen Hill to Bayardo near Clench Common, and from West Kennet to Ogbourne St Andrew, where Ogbourne Farm was purchased in 1920. As it included the Manton Down Training Establishment, the whole estate was known as the Manton Estate and owned through 'The Olympia Agricultural Company Ltd', known locally as 'The Olympia'.

In the 1922 New Year's Honours List Joseph Watson was made a Baron and took the title Lord Manton. In March of the same year, while hunting with the Warwickshire Hounds, Lord Manton fell from his horse and died from heart failure. The contemporary obituary states, "Lord Manton never did anything by halves. Immensely wealthy, as everyone knows, he purchased the best that could be had as foundations for his agricultural enterprises." Hence probably the name of the farming company and the pedigree prefix of all the stock bred being Olympia. A prefix retained within the BOCM division of Unilever, of which Joseph Watson & Sons Ltd later became part.

By 1928 the estate (one of three built up by Watson, the others being near Leamington in Warwickshire and Selby in Yorkshire) had been dismantled. The land was sold off by Lord Manton's trustees, a task none too easy at the nadir of the agricultural depression. The upper part of Ogbourne Farm was sold to Tattersalls with Manton Down after Manton Down's famous trainer Alec Taylor, the Wizard of Manton, retired. The remaining portion of the estate was sold at auction in March 1928. This included the lower 467 acres of Ogbourne Farm (including this site) and 1,009 acres of West Woods and surrounding land.

Naming this site "The Olympia" is an attempt to recollect a small part of near forgotten history, and a coincidence.



Search for a long-lost half-brother

As you may have seen on Facebook, a Devizes-based amateur genealogist and researcher, is working with an Italian lady, Anna Onori, who is searching for her half-brother. Shortly before her father, Benedetto Onori, passed away, he revealed that he'd been a prisoner of war in the Marlborough area between 1944-46.



Benedetto was taken prisoner in North Africa by the British in 1943 and transferred to England in 1944. He was detained as a

Prisoner of War at Camp 621, located at Bonita Stables near Ogbourne Maizey. The camp was a satellite camp to

the larger POW camp at Wanborough. Benedetto remained in the Wiltshire area as a prisoner worker until April 1946. During this time, he was sent to work on a farm where we believe he developed a relationship with a local lady. The result of this relationship was a son named Edward, who must have been born around 1945-46.

We have very little to go on, but from what we know, Edward knew the truth about his father and visited Italy with his wife/girlfriend in the 1970s to meet Benedetto.

Unfortunately, Benedetto's Italian wife (Anna's mother) forbade him to tell his Italian children about their English half-brother. Anna very much regrets her parents' decision and would love to find out more about Edward. Following her father's death Anna discovered a set of photographs with the name 'Edward 1976' written on the back.
